#### → GWBAA Golf Tournament Rescheduled to Wednesday, November 2:

Due to flooding at the International Country Club on Columbus Day weekend, the GWBAA golf tournament has been rescheduled to **Wednesday**, **November 2**, **2005**. Registration and breakfast will begin at 8:30 a.m., with a shotgun start at 9:30 a.m. The barbecue luncheon and awards ceremony will begin at approximately 1:30 pm. and conclude by 3:00 p.m.

#### → General Aviation Returns to Reagan National Airport Tomorrow:

General aviation is scheduled to return to Reagan National Airport tomorrow, October 18th – the last airport to restore business aviation operations since the attacks of 9/11. As noted in previous editions of the GWBAA News, operators will be required to carry the equivalent of an air marshal on board, and also submit passenger and crew manifests 24 hours in advance. Prior to 9/11, there were 660 business aviation flights each day at the airport. A study commissioned by the NBAA concluded that nearly \$1.3 billion in economic activity was forfeited between September 2001 and March 2004 as a result of the ban. Initially, no more than 48 general aviation flights will be allowed daily, but that number could increase if the program is successful in the early going. All GWBAA Members are invited for coffee at Signature Flight Support to witness the arrival of the first flight at approximately 7:00a.m.

#### → Don't Forget to Secure Your Aircraft:

Even as general aviation returns to Reagan National Airport, the media is again questioning the security of our industry. On October 9, Daniel Andrew Wollcott – who has a commercial license but is not qualified to fly that particular aircraft - took five unknowing friends on a joyride from St. Augustine, Florida to Briscoe Field near Atlanta. Although Wollcott's attorney has stated that his client has a drinking problem and is not a threat to national security, it is quite possible that this incident will be cited as a further justification for imposing new restrictions on general aviation - and emphasizes the continuing importance of securing aircraft when unattended.

#### → U2 Concert Tickets Winner:

#### → DHS Accuses Pilot Of Flying Too Close To ADIZ – 2,000 Miles Too Close:

Just in case you aren't already concerned, the website AVweb.com reports that an Arizona pilot, Dale Mooneyham, recently received a letter from the Department of Homeland Security alleging that he had operated an aircraft inside the ADIZ without a discrete transponder code or communicating with AT on September 2, 2005 – despite the fact that Mooneyham, and his aircraft, were approximately 2,000 miles away, and have the receipts and tower tapes to prove it. Mooneyham speculates that the DHS requested the offending aircraft's n-number from a greater Washington area airport - and that the airport made an incorrect guess. Needless to say, this incident does not encourage general aviation to place their trust in DHS or FAA's ability to manage the ADIZ – but also emphasizes that local airports shouldn't put pilots at risk through guesswork. #### → DC Air Defense Identification Zone (ADIZ) Comments Due November 2nd:

The FAA has released a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM), available online at <a href="http://dmses.dot.gov/docimages/pdf92/341297\_web.pdf">http://dmses.dot.gov/docimages/pdf92/341297\_web.pdf</a>, that proposes to make permanent the current temporary flight restrictions for certain aircraft operations in the greater Washington, D.C. area. Other aviation associations have released statements urging their Members to comment on the NPRM.

The FAA's proposal would make permanent the current "temporary" airspace restrictions in our area. All who fly in this area know that the Washington, D.C. ADIZ was created back in February 2003, in response to a heightened national threat level. It was a impulsive move and was explained as a temporary restriction. But when the government later reduced the national threat level, the ADIZ remained.

As part of the federal process of rulemaking individuals are allowed to officially contest an FAA proposed rule. This is important to us all because, if the ADIZ is made permanent, everyone in the country flying in or near Class B airspace (there are 29 other such areas) could face the same restrictions.

The FAA needs to hear from you by November 2nd so they fully understand how difficult it is to operate in and near the ADIZ
